#### **Business Travelers Beware:** Hotel Internet Connections Present New Cyber Risk

The FBI, together with the National White Collar Crime Center (NW3C), has released a report alerting travelers about malware infections on devices connected to hotel Internet services.

Submitted by John Forsyth, Commercial Insurance Producer Cyber criminals are targeting travelers abroad with malware infections through pop-up windows. The windows appear when they connect to the Internet using the hotel's connection service.

Laptop and other Wi-Fi device users have experienced pop-up windows informing them that an update of well-known software is available to them. When the user clicks on the pop-up to accept and install the update, a malicious software program is installed.

The FBI is suggesting that travelers take special care when updating software through hotel Internet connections. If possible, travelers should complete all software updates before travel or go directly to the software company's website for updates if necessary while traveling. The Federal Trade Commission's Bureau of Consumer Protection offers these additional tips to help business travelers keep employer equipment and data safe:

1. Discourage employees from using shortcuts for passwords and access codes or keeping written passwords with their laptop.

2. Have employees remove unnecessary company data from their laptop before traveling.

3. Employees should avoid working on confidential files in closequarters such as airplane seats.

4. Require your employees to have up-to-date firewall, anti-spyware protection, and the latest security patches on the devices they take with them on business trips.

5. Establish policies for regulating off-site access to sensitive data.
6. Implement a security response plan. Make sure employees who travel understand the importance of reporting a security breach to limit risk. *Submitted by John Forsyth......*

#### FUNERAL HOMES ADAPT TO CHANGING MARKET

In 2010 the U.S. cremation rate was about 41%, up from 26% in 2000 and just 9.72% in 1980. "Increased cremation is a challenge because funeral homes made their money on the casket markup,' said Kevin Rosenau of Twin Falls' Rosenau Funeral Home. In 2009 the average cost of a funeral was \$6,560, excluding the

cost of a cemetery plot, marker, flowers, obituary in the paper, yault, and misc. costs. In contrast to the above, the average cost of cremation is \$1,105 In 2010, 68% of deaths were casketed according to the Casket & Funeral Supply Assoc., a

4% decrease since 2005. In 2000, 79% of deaths were casketed.

This changing market has caused funeral homes to diversify by not only having accommodation for the memorial service, but an event center, staying open for family events, family dinners, even birthday parties and bridal showers. Also, the changing market and technology resources have created added services such as the creation of memorial videos, live online broadcasts of the funeral, and DVD's of the service the family can keep, on line guest books, and personalized memorial services that reflect the family's wishes. #### PRICE YOUR HOUSE TO SELL QUICKLY

**IF HOME LACKS FEATURES OF RECENT COMPS, IT'S TIME TO SUBTRACT VALUE** A first-quarter survey of homebuyers and sellers done by HomeGain.com, a real estate services website, revealed that 76 percent of homeowners believe their home is worth more than the list price recommended by their real estate agent.

- a. A big shade tree will knock nearly \$70 off annual air conditioning bills
- b. A large evergreen that blocks winter winds will reduce heating costs by around \$60/year

#### Senior Safety Tips for Winter

As winter closes in, it is important for seniors and those who care for them to be aware of some simple precautions. Seniors are at risk during the winter months for several reasons. Winter weather and storms may isolate the elderly more than usual. Diseases such as the common cold and the flu



are more prevalent and present a particular risk to those who are older or already in weakened health. There are also the dangers that the cold weather itself presents to those who are vulnerable.

In response to these circumstances, the American Red Cross has issued its annual winter-preparedness tips for senior citizens.

- Be sure to arrange to have someone check on older persons regularly. It is also a good idea to have a plan to signal the need for help. For example, a daily phone call to check in might be appropriate. Post emergency numbers near the phone as well.
  - We never know when severe weather might hit. If specialized care, medical supplies, or equipment is needed, plan ahead for these items or health care services. Have several people available who have been familiarized with procedures or equipment. It is also a good idea to have enough food and supplies to last at least three days.
