BAN THE BOTTLE!

Concord. Massachusetts has become one of the first communities in the U.S. to ban the sale of single-serving plastic water bottles.

Octogenarian Jean Hill lead the charge, saving in an interview, "The bottled water companies are draining our aquifers and selling it back to us."

The Town of Concord's website describes the bylaw, stating "It shall be unlawful to sell non-

sparkling, unflavored drinking water in single-serving polyethylene terephthalate (PET) bottles of 1 liter (34 ounces) or less in the Town of Concord on or after January 1, 2013." There is an exemption for an "emergency adversely affecting the availability and/or quality of drinking water to Concord residents."

The first offense results in a warning, the second in a \$25 fine, and the third (and each following offense) in a \$50 fine. Concord's Health Division staff are in charge of enforcing the ban.

Below are some interesting reasons to "Ban The Bottle":

* The recommended eight glasses of water a day, at U.S. tap rates equals about \$.49 per year; that same amount of bottled water is about \$1,400

* It takes 17 million barrels of oil per year to make all the plastic water bottles used in the U.S. alone. That's enough oil to fuel 1.3 million cars for a year

* In 2007, Americans consumed over 50 billion single serve bottles of water. With a recycling rate of only 23%, over 38 billion bottles end up in landfills

* Antimony, which is found in PET plastic bottles, in small doses can cause dizziness and depression; in larger doses it can cause nausea, vomiting and death.

IS THERE A METH LAB OPERATION ON YOUR PROPERTY?

- Rent payments made in cash
- Excessive trash (fuel cans, antifreeze containers, other household products)

• Red-stained walls; stripped batteries; blue, corroded valves on propane cylinders

WORTH THE PAPER IT'S PRINTED ON? A HISTORY OF THE BANKNOTE

Governments print it, misers hoard it under their mattresses, rich people light their cigars with it - but where does the idea of paper money come from, anyway?

China, actually. The banknote apparently originated during the Tang Dynasty (7th century), to replace bulky copper coins carried by merchants. The coins were minted with rectangular holes in their center so they could be strung together on cords, but wealthy merchants found that lugging their coins around was difficult.

A system was born in which merchants left their coins with a trusted agent in exchange for a note stating exactly how much money was being held. The merchant could return the note at any time to redeem his or her coins, and in time paper money called "jiaozi" evolved.

In Europe, banknotes first came into use in the 14th century. The term "banknote" derives from nota di banco. The holder of a note could redeem it for an amount of silver or gold held on deposit with a bank.

In the New World, the Massachusetts Bay Colony was the first of the American colonies to circulate its own banknotes in the

early 1690s, but all 13 colonies were issuing their own notes by the early 1700s.



The First Bank of the United States, chartered by Congress in 1789 shortly after the signing of the Constitution, was authorized to issue banknotes, but the U.S. federal government didn't start printing its own paper money until 1862.

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Did You Know: Table Manners

* At a formal place setting, the silverware should be placed so that the utensils are used from outside to inside. In other words, the salad fork should be place farther from the plate than the dessert fork. * When eating bread from a common breadbasket, place your bread on your plate first. Then take some butter and place it on your plate as well. Use this to butter your bread. Do not take butter from the butter dish and directly butter your bread. To eat soup, dip your soup spoon into the bowl and scoop away from you. Only fill your spoon about two-thirds full and sip it from the side of the spoon. Never slurp. * Once used, a utensil should not be placed back on the table. It should be laid on a flat dish or plate. * Salt and pepper should always be passed together, even if someone asks only for one. * To indicate that you are finished eating, place your knife and fork on the plate so that they are parallel to each other, at the eleven o'clock position (a diagonal from bottom right to top left) with the points facing away from you. Place your napkin on the table, not on your plate or on your chair. * If you are

unsure of what to do next in a formal dinner setting, simply take your cues from your host. You can sit, eat, put your napkin on the table, and leave as soon as your host does so, unless you are asked to do otherwise.

Overnight French Toast

7 cups of French bread cut into cubes (shave off bottom crust)

- 3 oz. cream cheese softened
- 4 Tablespoons sugar
- 8 oz. whipping cream
- 1/2 cup of maple syrup
- 6 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Put bread in bottom of greased 9x13 pan. Beat cream cheese & sugar, mix in whipcream & sugar until fluffy. In separate bowl, whisk eggs, vanilla, cinnamon and pinch of salt. Fold into cream cheese mixture. Pour over bread, over and refrigerate overnight. Cook at 350 for 30 minutes. I made it 2 days ahead and it worked out GREAT! Submitted by Dee Anne Mosman.
